GAYFIELD ASSOCIATION AGM

The Association held its 25th AGM in the Police Station, Gayfield Square on Friday 26th May with 24 members present.

The Association looks after amenity issues for the area bounded by Broughton Street, East London Street, Windsor Street and Greenside. It came to life when there was a 1968 proposal to drive a motorway through the heart of the area, demolishing 3000 houses in its wake!

Chairman Ian Dunn outlined the year's activities. There had been more conversions of offices to houses, and some sub-division of larger main door houses into smaller flats. A major employer, Standard Life, was to move from Annandale Street to Lothian Road in the next year. A big local hotel, The Windsor, which had at one time tried to buy up the whole of Windsor Street. had withdrawn its application by another 30 bedrooms. There was the usual annual moan at the eyesores around the unfinished building site at Greenside. Members hoped that the grand plans for Annandale Street/McDonald Road would include East London Street at an early stage.

The meeting heard about progress on the Mansfield Place Church. A "Use and Cost Report" will be examined by the Mansfield Traquair Trust on 13th June (Councillor McGregor, David Rushton and Ian Dunn are the three locally-based trustees).

Betty McFarlane was chosen as Treasurer, Mark Cousins as Secretary (558 1721), with Ian Dunn serving another year as Chairman.

HAVE YOUR SAY ON CHANNEL 5

You may have read about the new Channel 5 TV service in the press recently. The Institute of Local Television based in Bellevue Place does research on local TV and believes that Scotland is about to miss out with this new service unless the Scottish people can get their views across. ILT invite Spurtle readers to write to the Independent Television Commission at 123 Blythswood Street, Glasgow G24AN requesting the ITC not to award the Channel 5 franchise because the bidders make no concessions to Scottish interests in their programme proposals. Last time there was a public consultation on television in 1993 there were only 76 responses in all - but 26 of these came from Scotland. We know there's a strong interest in Edinburgh in seeing more local programmes. So let's try and make the Scottish lobby reach 50% this time! The issue of who controls the airwaves in each town and city is important as media jobs become more and more significant to the local economy.

Recently Graham Allen MP Shadow Minister for the Media called for Channel 5 to be introduced as a local service to 'broaden the involvement of citizens in television'. But without your 'citizen involvement' in advance of awarding Channel 5 the service will go on air in 1997 as a blanket UK channel and it will ignore Scotland's democratic debate by overlooking it. 

THE CALTON HILL STORY



Last month we ran the story of a fence that had appeared on Calton Hill, denying public access to part of the park. Our reporter's enquiries suggested that it had been put up for the convenience of a local householder, who had complained about noise and camping too near her back garden.

Spurtle contacted Mrs. Gillespie again just before going to print. She agrees that the area in question is public land. "But my title deeds give me free ish and entry to Calton Hill. How can I have free entry if the grass outside my gate is covered in dog dirt and frequented by drug addicts? There always used to be a fence and gate there, they were only taken down after the war. Anyway, I'm not going into it, you can do what you like about it, goodbye."

Our own local councillor passed the issue to Calton District Councillor Douglas Kerr, who's now been to see the fence for himself:

"I was unaware that it had happened and will certainly be raising the matter with the Parks Department. If this is land that is held for the public good then I would be seriously concerned about the people of Edinburgh being denied access to it. I have been involved in campaigning against the sections of the Criminal Justice Act which allows landowners to restrict public access to vast areas of the Scottish countryside. This certainly seems like double standards to me. I will be pursuing this, and will give you the latest in the next issue."

Meanwhile, if you want access to this part of Calton Hill, you can write to Mr. McKay in the Parks Department or phone him on 529 7911 and ask him for a key.

PLANNING YOUR ENVIRONMENT

The Community Council's May meeting focused on ideas for the future of the Annandale/McDonald Road area - beyond the immediate question of Barratt Homes' application to build flats (see McDONALD RD UPDATE)

About 26 people attended: a discussion of planning ideas perhaps doesn't seem so urgent as protesting against a particular application; and it was a beautiful spring evening, when sitting indoors at a meeting wasn't the first thing that sprang to mind! But encouraged by some suggestions from the Appleton Partnership, plenty of ideas did emerge. Afterwards Spurtle spoke to Pat Robertson of McDonald Place:

"I found it very interesting. Certainly everyone had a chance to air their views - and there were very varied views. But there is room to satisfy everyone's interests, if we are all flexible. And I was surprised to discover what a broad range of subjects the Community Council covered. I'd certainly like to go to another of their meetings."

MCDONALD RD UPDATE

In our April issue we reported on the public meeting about Barratt Homes plans to build 171 flats in McDonald Road. People at the meeting were overwhelmingly against the plans. A McDonald Area Amenity Society was set up to pursue the matter. Here MAAS chair George Reiss reports on developments.

We are aiming at two results:

- to get a good development in the whole area between McDonald Road and Annandale Street which will make this a better area to live in
- to stop the high building on the McDonald Road frontage, which will block light and view to people living there.

The main reason the affair is so complicated is that there are two things happening which are intertwined. The Council is having to decide what to do with the wider area (should it stay industrial, or go residential, should there be a "prestige project" on the site); while Barratt are applying to build flats on one part of the whole site. If you wrote to protest the Barratt application, you may have received a report written by officials for the Planning Committee, bringing together different ideas of how to develop the area. "The report has already been circulated to interested bodies and their views will be made available, with supplementary report if necessary, before the Committee meeting on the 27 April." And when did this report arrive on our doorsteps? Why, on 26 April, a whole day before the Committee meeting.

BROUGHTON STREET CENTRE'S FUTURE?

After talks with the previous users of 103 Broughton Street, staff and users of the Stafford Centre are now in serious negotiations with the Social Work Department - with a view to moving in. The lease on their current premises expires in December, and they really need more space to offer more services.

There are plenty of practical points to sort out yet, so it's by no means a foregone conclusion that they will come to Broughton Street. But manager Alex Campbell told Spurtle that Stafford Centre users had visited No 103 and were very enthusiastic about the possibility.

Meanwhile the group who were evicted from the building back in December are still active, operating from a base at St Stephen's Church, now under the name of the Autonomous Centre of Edinburgh.

HOPETOUN CRESCENT

Drummond Community High School Pupils were once again at work in Hopetoun Crescent gardens last week. This time they were there celebrating Environment Week by putting up bird and bat boxes that they had made themselves, and by clearing some of the Himalayan Balsam, a non native plant which is gradually pushing out other species from the garden.

Their efforts are being rewarded in many ways, including a picture and article about their work in the Evening News, and a prize of £100 from British Telecom.

The next stage in their plan to create a Local Nature Reserve in Hopetoun Crescent Gardens is to produce a long term management plan which will enable them to apply for funding further work.

CONFERENCE SAYS LOCAL COMMUNITIES MUST BE HEARD

New Town Broughton and Pilrig Community Council hosted a conference in New Parliament House on Saturday 27th May, on the theme "Planning and Transport: New **Opportunities for Edinburgh?**"

70 community councillors and members of the public heard speakers including town planner Clara Greed - "dead keen on public toilet provision, and sceptical of 'men of Vision' planners", according to our reporter! There was a very encouraging convergence of opinion, which was that local communities have a right to be heard and, vitally, their views must be incorporated into local government work.

In the afternoon workshops mulled over two "propositions" tabled by our Community Council. There was firm support for a East-Central Scotland Transport Authority. This would regulate bus companies and railways, and ensure there was through ticketing. It would co-ordinate all passenger transport in its area - south Fife to near Borders including the four Lothian authorities. It would preserve concessionary travel. Its income would come from pollution and parking fines, fares and development grants.

The second proposition was about getting better resources to Edinburgh's community councils; councils don't really want more powers. There are elections on 26th September. Nominations close on 29th August: please think about standing, it's good for local democracy! Community Council secretary is Allan Wilson phone 554 9144.
