Local petition gets an answer

'Your petition should have had a proper response. I hope you will take this letter as that response. It is no mean feat to collect over 700 signatures and I accept and acknowledge the commitment to the quality of life in the community and the depth of disappointment at the demise of the steps that the petition indicates.'

The words of Ewan Aitken, the City Council's Executive Member for Education, in a recent letter to the 'Save Our Steps' Group. Back in mid-July a delegation from the Group met the Deputy Director of Education to present a petition signed by current staff and students at Drummond, Drummond adult students and community users, parents and children at three local primary schools, and hundreds of local residents.

The petition appealed against removal of the steps in Cochran Terrace, which would close a safe route to school for primary-aged children, and a long established community path; and it asked for a written guarantee from the City Council that community access to Drummond playground would not be cut back. Councillor Aitken stands by his support for the Head Teacher's decision to close the route through Drummond's playground. On community access to the playground outside school hours, he

reveals why it hasn't been possible to guarantee no cutback: community access was not included in the contract between the City Council and the private company now involved in managing Drummond facilities

But not all is doom and gloom. Inside we publish more of Councillor Aitken's letter, and comment on some of the issues involved in the whole unhappy saga that has unfolded at Drummond during the past nine months.

The first edition of **Spurtle** hit the streets in February, 1994: 'put together by a small group of locals inspired by the success of the anti-poll tax campaign, the struggle to save London Street Primary, and achievements by local residents' associations'. BRIEFLY

Refurbishment of McDonald Road Library is now complete. After an official ceremony in the morning, the library will reopen to the public at 1pm on Wednesday 17th December.

The Broughton Road Group will hold its AGM on Saturday, 31st January, 2-4.30pm in McDonald Road Library. There will also be a planting demonstration. Anyone interested in helping plan the AGM is welcome to attend a meeting at the Redbraes Centre at 6.30pm, 15th December. For further information phone Pat Eccles on 556 7550.

Dougie Sutherland has been appointed Environmental Warden for Broughton. He has already leafleted much of Broughton Road about dog-fouling in the area. He and the City Council will take action if local people phone with information about who and when – all information will be treated as confidential. His phone number is 669 1389.

Most of the road humps and colouring for Broughton's 20mph zone have been completed long since. But not in East London Street: there roadworks were delayed because Transco said they were going to install a new gas pipe. Then they changed their mind, and the roadworks are now in progress. The whole 20mph zone has to be brought into operation simultaneously, and that can't happen until all the physical preparation has been done: something to look forward to in 2004.

Councillor Aitken: 'I want to move forward on the safety issues that you raised with me'. Concerns about road safety in Broughton - especially for children going to and from school - were the subject of a meeting on 27th November. Councillor Davies arranged for representatives of local residents groups, schools and others to meet officials from City Development and the Police. Discussions are still at a very early stage, so if you have an opinion on where and how changes should be made this is the time to voice it. The Drummond saga

From Councillor Aitken's letter: 'The decision to remove the steps was taken in respect of increasing the safety and security of students, staff and community members who use the school by removing unsupervised public access through the school.'

At a meeting with 'Save Our Steps' representatives just before he wrote this letter, Councillor Aitken said that management of the school and surrounds was devolved to headteachers. So the decision to close the steps at Drummond was the Headteacher's, and hers alone: neither he nor the Education Department would rescind a headteacher's decision on a devolved matter in 'any but the most exceptional circumstances'; but it could be revoked by a subsequent headteacher.

There are many losers from the decision to remove the steps. Local residents have lost a community path some of them have been using for decades. Parents and primary-aged children have lost a safe route to and from their own schools. Cochran Terrace residents may have less hassle from a minority of unruly Drummond students, but the discipline problem has just been displaced to Melgund Terrace. Drummond has its work cut out to rebuild relations with the neighbouring community. For months the City Council seemed insensitive to local opinion. And our local councillor... well, not his finest hour.

Councillor Aitken again: 'I want to place on record my commitment to ensuring that access to the playground out of school hours is maximised, as I understand the role the playground has in providing safe space for the community. The need for community access to the playground was not included in the contract. This was an oversight due to the complexity of the task we were engaged in and not in any way an attempt to change the nature and use of the playground by the local community ... It does mean, however, that a change in the contract as signed will need to be negotiated'.

Long before refurbishment of Drummond started, Spurtle was assured by City officials that the PPP deal between Council and private company would not affect community use of school and playground. And at a public meeting in April our local councillor said that there would be 'no change in the status of the playground out of hours', 'no need to worry about that one'. Now it's obvious there was indeed good reason to worry. But we welcome Councillor Aitken's determination to put that right, and look forward to hearing how renegotiation of the contract progresses.

Councillor Aitken: 'With regards to the guidelines for community consultation, these guidelines need to balance headteachers' responsibilities as a manager of a school and the local people's role as participants in the decision-making process about community resources. I am confident that the guidelines can and will get that balance right.'

For months Education Department officials insisted that the decision to close the route via the Cochran Terrace steps was taken after local consultation - and that local opinion was evenly divided on the issue (one official even claimed a majority in favour of closure). But at his recent meeting with 'Save Our Steps' representatives Councillor Aitken said that the handling of consultation in this instance had been 'completely wrong', that the process of community consultation 'must be improved'; and agreed that guidelines should be drawn up to help ensure this.

So we may have lost our community route. But the persistence of Broughton residents over the last few months has at least revealed the need to renegotiate the PPP contract. And there's now general recognition that consultation must be much better before school management makes decisions that will directly affect the local community.

Calum Buchanan's recent work on his shop front has revealed a bit of Broughton Street's history. George Scott moved his bakery business there in 1873, with two traditional Scotch ovens in his basement bakehouse. Later he opened a second shop in East Claremont Street. The fame of his pies spread throughout Broughton: there was a special hot pie run at noon on Saturdays. In



1910 the Scotts and the Lyons, another firm of bakers, combined their businesses – having already been united by the marriage of a Scott daughter to a Lyon son.

Slower, cleaner, greener

Surprising that no-one had done it earlier! This was the feeling about the meeting which took place at Broughton Primary on 12th November. Representatives of local residents' associations and the City Council met at the suggestion of Councillor Trevor Davies to discuss issues centring around traffic and the environment. It was encouraging that City Council officers, and the police, turned out in force.

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Tel 0131 478 7222 E-mail: broughton prop@ednet.co.uk Residents' associations were generally pleased with the impending introduction of the 20mph zone, but had some reservations about the quality of some earlier calming measures. The Route Action Plan needed to be prioritised in view of the traffic increases for Broughton Street forecast under the Traffic Management Plan.

The delays due to roadworks in East London Street seemed to have been resolved and speed humps will be installed by 31st March or earlier. The usual problems of litter and rubbish disposal were also on the list, and Council officers were keen to enlist the help of residents inidentifying offenders. New sanctions were in place to deal with dog-fouling. The issue of green spaces was seen as vital in maintaining the quality of life in the area, and


