LOGIE GREEN ROAD

Residents challenge developer

Local residents are up in arms about plans for the Vogue site, near the Broughton Road end of Logie Green. The site extends through to Beaverbank Place, and along behind the back gardens of the Logie Green Road tenements. Developer Westpoint Homes Ltd seek planning permission to build 135 residential units, plus 1,700 square metres of commercial accommodation.

Nick Roache lives in the stair adjacent to the Vogue car park. He explained to **Spurtle** that the tenements are 'divided down the middle': half the flats face onto Logie Green Road; but the other half, including his own, face out to the back towards Beaverbank. A warehouse already restricts light to their homes, but this will get much worse if Westpoint's plans are allowed to go ahead: the new building will be as high as their own tenement, and right at the

bottom of their communal gardens - only 23 metres away. Nick says he's on the top floor, so might still get a glimpse of sky; people lower down will be much worse off.

That's why he and his neighbours

1917-2004


On 13th March family and friends met to celebrate the life of Frank Girling.

Frank had a long and distinguished life as social anthropologist, international traveller, socialist thinker and political activist - he and his wife Elizabeth met while serving the republican cause during the Spanish Civil War. In more recent

years he was active in the local anti poll tax group; and he helped plan the launch of **Spurtle** as a community paper - foster the growth of 'real democracy', he said, put local issues in a wider context, and 'stimulate more radical thinking'. He was a familiar and friendly figure in the area around his home in Drummond Place and the shops in Broughton Street.

Frank will be remembered with love, and with a great deal of respect.

Wimpey's planning appeal

Following two weeks of witness statements and intense crossexamination, the Shrub

Place Public Inquiry concluded on Thursday, 25 March with closing submissions by Harald Tobermann representing Third Parties (Pilrig Residents Association, Shaw's Colonies and Community Council, as well as various individuals), Gordon Steele QC the City Council, and Roy Martin QC the developers Wimpey.

The Inquiry Reporters are charged with establishing whether Wimpey's appeal against two earlier Council decisions to refuse planning permission for 300 new flats is justified. Wimpey's case centred on alleged 'unreasonable behaviour' by the Council and the claim that refusal based on design is a purely subjective decision.

The Council, defending their decisions, referred particularly to Wimpey's refusal to provide affordable housing, excessive heights and poor daylighting provision. Third Parties' argued that many, if not most aspects of design should be rationally justifiable and that it is the designers' duty to communicate their ideas clearly: Wimpey clearly failed in this key task.

Third Parties also cited many individual examples of poorly thought-through design, and highlighted the negative impact on the historic Shaw's Colonies and the reduced daylight and blocked views to Arthur's Seat and Calton Hill for Inchkeith Court residents. Leith Walk elevations came in for criticism for incorrect or incomplete representation in Wimpey's drawings, as well as for the negative impact on pedestrians.

A written decision is expected in a few months.

Crescent has recently been repaired, cleaned and gilded. We are all very pleased with the result as the clock really has been returned to its, rather impressive, former glory! The clock itself is maintained by the City and it was at their discretion that the work on the clock faces and mechanisms began. When we found out what was being done we asked Ritchies, who carry out the

maintenance work, to repair and restore the surround of the clock, which led to the subsequent gilding of its date of installation, 1826. As a result the members of Broughton St Mary's have incurred some of the costs of restoring this landmark of the New Town. Some of our neighbours in Scotland Street have already volunteered contributions, as they had used the clock themselves for so many years. If anyone else would like to contribute we would be very grateful, and we are glad to have been able to restore the clock for the benefit of all who live in Broughton.

CONGESTION CHARGES

The answer to bus problems?

Ishbel MacMillan of Broughton Road wrote to tell us about a bus problem. Thanks to a change in the No.5's route and then a change in the No.36's timetable, she can no longer get from home to her church in Leith in time for an 11am Sunday service - without going to Ferry Road or Leith Walk first.

Local Councillor Trevor Davies tells us Lothian Buses took the No.36 off

at off-peak weekend times because not enough people were using it - it was running at a loss. 'One of the great advantages of congestion charging, if people vote for it in our referendum', he says, 'will be that it gives us the money to subsidise many, many bus routes like this throughout the city. We aim for a ten-minute service on most routes throughout the whole day and the whole week.'
