Three years later and the school is still brimful of ideas. For example, last term each class contributed a song to a video made as an aid to learning Tables; and when a garage in the playground was demolished the pupils set about decorating the bare wall left



exposed. They "exploded" geometric shapes from their lessons, and explored shape in Islamic culture; they developed their own ideas in drawings and collage; and then they created brightly coloured mosaic tiles with guidance from two professional sculptors.



Every secondary school in Scotland is to receive 108 free books by Scotsborn authors from the Scottish Libraries Association, using lottery money channelled through the Arts Council. But what a contrast to the book selection from Everyman last month's **Spurtle** reported being forced on Drummond Community High! This time the books will be chosen after consulting librarians, teachers and children, who will be invited to nominate and vote for their choice.

Nominations for New Town Broughton and Pilrig Community Council have now closed. There were 15 nominees for 16 places as elected members, and 8 local interest groups registered to fill 8 places; so there will be no elections.

Their road is down in the 40s in a list of priorities for the whole of Edinburgh - which was a bit of a shock to some local activists, who remember being top priority for North Edinburgh two years ago!

Local kids and parents will have missed the swings and things removed from St Mark's Park play area. We're told they will be replaced, next financial year.



Vision needed for Mansfield?



We welcomed the purchase of the former church by Mansfield Traquair Trust. At last the future of both the building itself and the Phoebe Traquair murals is secure. But we're not yet inspired by plans for the use of the building. Offices down below, conferences and exhibitions above: will there be the buzz around the building we've experienced recently?

Continuing use as a Festival venue has been mentioned: so why is it not possible to work out some way of accommodating Cafe Graffiti? We feel uneasy about the enforced departure of Pete Simpson.

And what about it's place in the local community? **Spurtle** never thought the old church could become first-and-foremost a Broughton community centre - it's far too big for that. But it does occupy a prominent, central site in our neighbourhood. The

Meanwhile cyclists are anxious to see a cycleway down McDonald Road and across into St Mark's Park to link up with existing cycleways. Could provision for this and a safe crossing of Broughton Road be built into the development of the Blandfield site? Historic Scotland and Edinburgh City Council propose a merger of the New Town Conservation Committee and the Old Town Renewal Trust, to form a new 'World Heritage Organisation' whose remit will cover Edinburgh's World Heritage Site. But there are streets covered by one or other of the existing organisations which don't fall within the Heritage Site boundaries. This could mean some houses losing access to conservation funds - for example, the Georgian side of East Claremont Street. The Community Council has taken this up with the powers-that-be, arguing for transitional arrangements to alert residents in the affected areas of the change in their status and giving them 2 or 3 years in which applications for grant assistance will continue to be accepted.
