Local shops back clean up

Members of the CleanUp Broughton group have been discussing waste disposal with local shops and other businesses. They've called on 60-plus premises in Broughton Street, and round the corners into London Street and East London Street. The response has been mainly positive, including another offer of free coffees for volunteers taking part in the next CleanUp Day! Still plenty of room for

improvement, though. The main problem seems to be that the timing of uplift of waste from some premises means it is left lying out too long. Maybe contracts need to be re-negotiated?

Businesses were also invited to show their support by putting up CleanUp posters. Just before going to press **Spurtle** spotted 13 already prominently displayed.

Flats plan worries residents

"Unbelievably awful" was one reaction to the plan for the corner site at 84-86 East Claremont Street. The existing building would be demolished and one housing 13 flats built in its place. The building portrayed in the architect's drawing would stand out like a sore thumb! A group of local residents were just about to meet and begin organising the resistance as we went to press. The planning application and drawings can be seen at the Council's Enquiry Office at 1 Cockburn Street.

Disruption to water supply

Many Broughton residents face disrupted water supply when East of Scotland Water carry out replacement of old water mains this autumn. The work will start in early September (in Bellevue Place) and go on through to the end of November (finishing in

Bellevue Road). Large parts of Bellevue will be affected, together with East Claremont Street, Annandale Street, Hopetoun Street, McDonald Street and Place, Dryden Terrace, Mansfield Place and Broughton Road. But sometimes only parts of a street

Hurry on down there! The annual Scotland Yard summer festival takes place on Saturday 18th August, 11am to 4pm. Complete with cafe, stalls, music, activities for all ages - and dinosaurs.

A 'right turn filter' for traffic going from Rodney Street to Broughton Road is part of an upgrade of traffic lights due within the next few months. This should benefit the No.13 bus service, which is often delayed by problems at this junction. The upgrade will also include full facilities for visually impaired pedestrians at the green man crossings.

Local residents signed a petition objecting to aspects of the planning application for the Brown Brothers site, Broughton Road. An improved version of the plan was approved by the Council's development quality sub-committee on 25th July. Councillor Lazarowicz, who supported the petitioners, says the scheme is "still too large and bulky for the site"; but "a large number of conditions have been placed on the development, which I hope will at least lessen the impact on surrounding properties".



are included: a detailed schedule has been posted through doors. Inevitably, there will be some local traffic problems.

The work also includes replacing service pipes from the mains to property boundaries; and the Water Board has issued a warning in this connection. In some older properties electrical circuits were earthed to water supply pipes: replacement of the service pipe will make the earthing ineffective. If in doubt, consult a qualified electrician!

Dog dirt and other litter

Last month we published a letter about the dog dirt menace which called for a ban on dogs in Hopetoun Crescent Gardens. Robin Benson of Broughton Street responds:


Dog litter is here to stay (I'm not a dog owner myself). Banning or fining dog littering is punitive and ineffective. There needs to be a clear understanding as to where the dogs can be taken, and where it is out of bounds. This makes for a generally healthier environment!

And Robin has this suggestion for rubbish bins:

Broughton Street needs rubbish bins every 20 metres or so, and they should be something the community is proud of (not just awful looking bins) - clearly distinguishable as 'Broughton Street' bins.

Bus trouble

The local bus service took a knock earlier this year when the route of the 35/35A along Broughton Road (now the 36) was cut to end at Duke Street. This removed a link from Broughton and Canonmills to the Shore and Easter Road. And frequency was cut from 20 to 30 minutes. Following many complaints about long waits for the bus, Lothian Buses have now introduced a temporary timetable which restores the 20 minute frequency; but the route westwards has been cut, to end at Charlotte Square instead of Tolcross! Local Councillor Lazarowicz is still arguing with Lothian Buses over this route. He asks concerned residents to contact him, to help demonstrate the level of feeling over this issue: phone 555 0598.




Festival in Broughton

We've lost two major Festival venues, Cafe Graffiti and The Palladium. But there's still a fair bit of local action during the coming Festival Fringe (5-27 August):

Reading, writing and number skills

Local people all over Edinburgh have an opportunity to help raise adult literacy and numeracy levels in their own areas.

Volunteers are being recruited by Adult Basic Education to help support adults who are developing their everyday reading, writing and number skills. Run by Community Education's Community Based Adult Learning Teams, groups are based in venues all over the city, north south east and west, and offer students both daytime and evening provision. Some groups also include people who want to develop their information technology (ICT) skills, people who are deaf and hard of hearing and people with learning disabilities.


This latest recruitment of volunteer tutors comes as a result of a recent government report which estimated that 800,000 adults in Scotland have very low literacy and numeracy skills.

More trees in Broughton?

Trees can bring many benefits to a community. They help to improve air quality and give a sense of well-being, enriching our lives and helping children to understand the rhythm of the seasons. In other cities in this country and in Europe, pavement cafes are often shaded by street trees while small green spaces provide areas for people to sit out and small children to play. As the growth of new housing and offices in our area increases at very high densities, the need for more

greenery in the environment increases too.

An environmental project is now exploring the possibilities for more tree planting and the creation of small green places in the New Town and Broughton.
