Wheelies on the agenda

Since being set up at a highly successful public meeting in June, the Broughton Village Association has been tackling the many issues raised by local residents.

Focusing on two which were high on the list of priorities, the Association is holding an-

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BROUGHTON Spurtle

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School upgrade one step closer



At long last, the Amey/Miller consortium has been confirmed as

Edinburgh Council's partner in the public-private partnership to refurbish or rebuild the capital's schools, including Drummond Community High School.

After the delay reported in July's **Spurtle**, on 23rd August the Council finally gave the go-ahead for negotiations to be finalised over the next 2-3 weeks, and signature of the contract should follow soon.

According to Council sources, work at Drummond will begin early in the schedule thereafter, and rumours around the school suggest start-dates during September and October. No firm dates for the beginning of work are on offer yet, but the Edinburgh Schools Partnership aims to have all buildings operational by August 2003.

Broughton Spurtle is free and completely independent

Our local councillor has been told that the 'provisional construction completion' date for Drummond is November 2002.

It seems, too, that objections raised by individuals and **Spurtle** about the quality of public consultation in this area may have been noted. Council Communications Officers are planning meetings with local residents to discuss the implications of site-work for the community.

So far, ESP's handling of the Drummond Community High School project has been inept from a PR point of view, muddled and insensitive to local opinion and needs.

Hopefully, Amey's confirmation as the Council's partner will mark a new and better start.

Playgroup still homeless

Drummond Playgroup, which in one guise or another has operated locally for 30 years, did not restart at the beginning of the new academic term.

Forced – at short notice – to leave Drummond Community High to make way for new developments under the public-private partnership scheme, staff have been unable to find suitable new premises. Hence, over 20 children and their parents have been obliged to make alternative arrangements.

The playgroup – offering very inexpensive care, education, and fun for pre-school children – has been an integral part of the Broughton scene for years, with hundreds of local kids passing through its doors. However, despite intensive efforts and

widespread local support, a new venue has proved elusive. The playgroup has even been turned away from the Church of Scotland's spacious church hall at East Broughton Place, on the grounds of insufficient storage

capacity: but no-one seems to have asked how much storage space it actually requires!

Last call on current councillor

There wasn't a date for the by-election for Broughton councillor as we went to press, but Mark Lazarowicz told us: "I'll be standing down at some stage before the end of the Westminster Parliamentary recess whatever happens" – that is, before 15th October. So we chased up some issues we've been pursuing with him over the last couple of years.

Europeans are still blocking the pavement in East London Street!

"I have asked the officials to get back to the police about this. You are right to say that the situation appears to be getting worse again, having improved a lot for some time."

Progress on yellow lines to protect the crossing points in East Claremont Street?

"The final order went through Council Executive on 31st July, so I'm promised it shouldn't take long now as that is all the legal hoops gone through at last. It was delayed because 2 objections were received during the formal advertising process – one was dropped, but one was maintained."

East London Street traffic calming didn't happen during the school holidays.

"Apparently during the consultation process a problem arose with the location of some of the street furniture (a BT junction box or some such, I'm told). It had to be redesigned – nothing major, but it took time. A revised plan was sent in a day or so ago by Bryants, who will be doing the work as part of the planning conditions."

Why was a pedestrian crossing dropped from plans for Broughton Street?

"The difficulty is partly funding, but also (hostile) views from traders about the loading/parking space that would be taken away. This is a real problem – you can see from the existing crossing at the bottom of the street how much space is required. The compromise is to have two traffic islands at the top of Broughton Street: as these are less expensive, I am campaigning to try and get these put in before the RAP scheme (still a year or so away).

"I should say that I am somewhat concerned that the revised RAP scheme doesn't have enough in it for pedestrians/cyclists/shoppers, and I am meeting this week with the transport officials to lobby them to include more."

When will we see 20 mph zones in Broughton?

"This is subject to Council and Scottish Executive approval. If that is given, as I expect it will be, it will take a year or so for measures to appear on the ground. The officials have confirmed that this is very likely to include most of the area between Broughton Road, Broughton Street, Leith Walk, and the railway line. This area would of course include many of the streets round St Mary's, Drummond and Broughton Primary. In addition, 20 mph zones are to be provided in and around the Powderhall and Brown Brothers developments. As speed limits are still a reserved matter, I will also support any calls at Westminster for wider introduction of 20 mph limits – my own view is that 20 mph should be the norm in residential areas."

Were there not supposed to be trees in front of the Bryants development in East London Street? And what about the parking outside the Cathedral on Sundays?

"I hadn't forgotten, but I haven't got the answers yet."

Wanted – a pal!

In June we reported that local fundraiser Nancy Blaik feared she'd lose her stance up on the walkway alongside the National Gallery. The walkway was to be closed during work on the Gallery; and anyway, "Timothy Clifford (the Gallery director) wants rid of us".

Now Nancy, of Claremont Bank, has had a reprieve: she can carry on collecting for another six months. Beyond that, the future's uncertain. She thinks that Mr Clifford's ultimate aim is to clear the area around the Gallery of anyone like herself, stallholders and

entertainers – who he feels are lowering the tone of his neighbourhood.

In charge at Gayfield

In 1973, Stephen Grieve pounded his first beat on Broughton Street. In April of this year he returned to take charge of a team of 100 or so, as the new Superintendent at Gayfield Square Police Station.

Spurtle asked him how he might balance the heavy responsibilities of city centre policing with the needs of the Broughton community. Though the appearance of the area had changed, the issues had not, said Stephen, and his responsibility was to "make people feel safe". His years in Corporate Development at Police HQ had also seen the adoption of new policing skills and techniques so that, alongside specialised units operating across the force, Community Officers are able to build up a knowledge of the needs of local areas.

For Stephen, among the main issues at local level are youth disorder, vandalism and graffiti, which deteriorate the quality of life – one of the main impressions he got on his return here. Essential to tackling this are consultation and effective communication with the community. He has promised feedback to the Community Council in September and a 'Partners Survey' with local focus groups is due later this year.

And, the newly kitted out 'bobbies on bikes' will soon be back, joined by a pilot squad of two mopeds! Far superior, says Stephen, at negotiating the hazards of Broughton's traffic – but that's another story!

Spurtle welcomes Supt. Grieve and hopes to be part of ongoing contact between Broughton and the local force.

The new session of adult education classes at Drummond Community High School is about to begin. There's a very **wide choice of courses** on offer. Most start in the week 24th-28th September, but a few kick off in the first week of the month. So don't delay – pick up a copy of the full programme at the school now.

Careless driving and **parking is a menace** around Broughton's schools – as it is elsewhere in the city. So worried parents whose children walk to school have welcomed a higher profile police presence at the start of the new term. It seems that parking within the areas marked by zig-zag lines is not a criminal offence as such – only if it can be proved to be dangerous or causing an obstruction. But the police say progress is being made in introducing double yellow lines outside school gates.
