

CITY-CENTRE BY-ELECTION



Councillor David Beckett (SNP, Ward 11 – City Centre) has stepped down in order to study in the United States. This will trigger a by-election, probably in August, in what is a marginal ward.

If a Lib-Dem or SNP candidate were to fail to be elected, the current coalition could no longer push through

decisions using Lord Provost George Grubb's casting vote. Interesting times would follow.

At the last Council election in 2007, on a 50% turnout, just 278 votes separated the top five parties. All parties were at least 360 1st-preference votes short of the electoral quota.

At the time of writing, independent candidate John Carson is standing on an anti-tram platform. The Green Party regard it as their 'most winnable by-election ward in Scotland', and were first among the main parties to name a candidate: Melanie Main.

Beckett told the *Spurtle*: I'm doing a Masters in Education Policy and Management at Harvard, though I'm hoping to do a PhD after that.

'My parting impressions are that I'm going to miss working for those in the City Centre ward and across the city as the Children & Families Vice-Convener. It's been a very eventful 4 years and it's been great to have been able to work with so many dedicated people, both Council workers and local residents.

'With my last full Council meeting on 30 June – when the fate of the trams could be decided – I think my career here is ending with a bang.'

HUGE EXAGGERATION OBSCURES FACTS

A fierce but brief fire, caused by a faulty fusebox, broke out in the Bakehouse Company café on Broughton Street around 8.30pm on 17 June.

The café was closed at the time, but the adjacent Khushi's Punjabi restaurant was evacuated. It closed afterwards owing to smoke damage (*Breaking news*, 18.6.11). Smoke also affected rented flats above.

No-one was hurt. Around 40 firefighters and 6 engines attended at one time or another.

WARD BOUNDARIES STAY

Following a review, on 23 June the Local Government Boundaries Commission recommended to Scottish Ministers that City of Edinburgh Council's ward boundaries need not be altered in advance of next year's council election. CEC has welcomed the proposal.

Broughton will thus remain a fanciful space like Oz or Brigadoon, with neighbours who share the same shops, schools and amenities politically divided between City Centre, Leith Walk and Inverleith wards.

Whether this disadvantages Broughton residents, or potentially renders them disproportionately influential, is a matter for debate.

The public was apparently consulted on this matter, although *Spurtle* has yet to meet anyone whose views were sought or offered. Another review is scheduled for 2015. See: [http://bit.ly/jmfTZG].



GUTS NEW TOWN RESTAURANTS'), this was not an incident of Towering Inferno proportions. No properties were 'destroyed'.

Bakehouse staff – who afterwards thanked the Fire Brigade and well-wishers – described the fire as 'small' and said damage was 'not as bad as it could have been'. They confidently expect to reopen 'within a few weeks'.

Khushi's staff, reported in the *Evening News* as fearing they could not reopen in time for the Festival, told the *Spurtle* they would resume trading in the last week of June. Draw your own conclusions.

A MODEST PROPOSAL

With trams to Leith 'cancelled' (*Briefly*, p.2.), Pilrig activist Harald Tobermann has called on councillors to make good the damage done locally.

He demands a scheme which includes: renovation of pavements, kerbs and pedestrian crossings on Leith Walk; reinstatement of damaged/removed street furniture; removal of cables strung from posts; replacement of temporary barriers and traffic measures; repair of bus/cycle priority lanes; replanting of trees; overhauls of bus stops, and waste collection; an extended shopfront renovation programme.

He suggests this could partly be funded by utility companies which had their plant renewed at a huge discount whilst – through poor or non-existent site drawings – contributing to the mess and muddle. See *Letters* online.

Council decision on Bonnington must wait

A report has gone before the Council recommending that the former Bonnington Primary School be turned into a dedicated Gaelic primary school. Local reaction has been mixed (*Breaking news*, 9.6.11).

The Scottish Government had offered to pay £1.4m towards the projected £1.6m cost of refurbishment. However, the recent effects of vandalism, roof damage and consequent water ingress have increased that refurbishment figure to an as yet undetermined sum (possibly more than £3.6m), and it is unclear whether Ministers will make good the difference. For these reasons, the Council will not make a decision on Bonnington until September (as opposed to 30 June, as had been originally planned). Even if councillors were to give the go-ahead for Bonnington, the length of time necessary to complete repairs there would rule out opening in August 2012, so current arrangements will continue at Tollcross Primary School for the time being.



Kimberley Reed – Broughton and Scotland's rising field athletics star – has won further recognition and £250 from Commonwealth Games Scotland as an Athlete of the Month.

Judges cited her smashing of the Commonwealth Youth Games qualification standard for the hammer in April (by 4m), and her setting of a new U-17 record of 53.63m which may well see her qualify for this month's World Youth Championship (*Breaking news*, 13.6.11).

Kimberley, now aged 16, is currently ranked seventh in the world at U-18 level.

Helping hands just the ticket



Staff from thetrainline.com, the Canonmills-based online ticketseller, painted the senior common room at Drummond CHS, and weeded beds and refreshed asphalt designs at Broughton PS on 24 June.

Led by project managers Emily Direen and Dave Wilkins, the 21 willing bodies were taking part in 'National Give and Gain Day', a nationwide event to publicise the usefulness and benefits of volunteering. This is the fourth year in a row that staff from the company have participated.

Local exchange of views on listed building



The Waverley Telephone Exchange on East London Street is a structure which divides opinion.

Gillon and McDowell, in a study of *Edinburgh's* Post-War Listed Buildings (see Extras, 1.7.11), speak admiringly of its 'strong compartmentalised faces' They see a 'fine, geometrically designed Modernist building'. Gifford, McWilliam and Walker - authors of the Edinburgh volume in the Buildings of Scotland series - disagree. They call it 'a big simple block with over Broughton on 24 June to mark Armed an officious vertically emphasized frontage'. Gillon and McDowell claim it 'demonstrates the forthright ideals of post-war planning and modern architecture'.

Gifford et al. describe it as 'fascist-looking'.

Designed by Robert Saddler in 1962 and erected in 1964 for the Ministry of Works, the building has since 2007 been one of 3 Edinburgh telephone exchanges listed. Saddler was also responsible for the modern interior of West Register House on Charlotte Square, and the Herbarium and Library in the Royal Botanic Garden.

What nearly all locals agree upon is affection for the exchange's decorative tile panel attached to protruding terrazzo concrete ribbing above the front door. It was made by Malkin-Johnson Tiles, with some of its 122 components (in 29 discrete designs) stemming from the earlier Malkin Tile Co. and the work of Kiwi designer and ceramicist Ken Clark, MBE (1922–). Clark was a craft potter in London at the time, but later moved to Lewes in Sussex where he remains active.

The excellent refurbishment of Edinburgh's chequered, B-listed Scotsman Steps, which connect North Bridge with Market Street, has been completed to just acclaim. The £250,000 development, a 3-way partnership between the City Council, Edinburgh World Heritage and the Fruitmarket Gallery, features the work of Turner Prize artist Martin Creed. Each step is a different coloured marble, as are the striking connecting floors. Whereas, in the past, descending the steps in haarish weather provoked images of dungeons at the bottom, now in a great rarity of sunlight one might have an image of gondolas and Venetian lagoons awaiting below ...
